


Partisan Differences on Policy and Messaging for Investment in Kids

(QUALITY/SAFETY) Nothing is more important to a parent than the health and safety of their children, and no parent should have to worry about the care their child is receiving while they are at work. We must ensure that all childcare programs meet quality and safety standards, so parents can go to work with peace of mind knowing their kids are safe and well cared for.	#1	#1	#2
(BRAIN DEVELOPMENT) Research shows that a child's brain develops most dramatically during the first 5 years of life. This critical period is a window of opportunity to lay the foundation for all the years that follow. (KEEP KIDS OFF STREETS) Research shows that before- and afterschool programs reduce crime and truancy by offering constructive alternatives to gangs, drugs, and violence. (HOMELESS) California has thousands of homeless families with children living in cars or on the streets, and young adults including foster youth on the streets. No child should grow up this way. We need to make it a top priority to help these children and families to keep young people from becoming chronically homeless.			
(PARENTS) The most important factor in helping children succeed in school and in life is getting their parents involved. That's why we need to invest in services to support parents and their ability to actively participate in their children's health and well-being.		#2	#1
(LOW WAGES) Childcare and afterschool workers are essential, but their salaries have not kept up with the rising cost of living. Most earn minimum wage; less than \$40,000 a year on average, which is not nearly enough to pay rent, afford childcare for their own children, and make ends meet in California. We must increase wages for early childhood educators, afterschool and childcare providers so that we can attract and retain the best people to care for our kids.	#3	#3
